

# St. Julie News 2016

Our Federation weekend for 2016 has been my first to have spent at Hinsley Hall, Leeds; and I can well understand how members find this such an ideal venue. I had the honour of becoming the 29<sup>th</sup> president of the BFNDNA at the conference held at Hinsley Hall Leeds on 18<sup>th</sup> September 2015, the last one very ably organised by Wendy and hosted by Margaret. The Saturday morning outing was to Ilkley and the AGM was in the afternoon. We had been informed that the charity for the next three years was to be **SPRED – Special Religious Development**. Sister Patricia Ellen Gribbon, Provincial Moderator, gave a talk outlining the aims and purpose of SPRED, a separate article about this will be included in St Julie News. On Saturday evening Judy Gibbons gave a very informative and interesting presentation about a donkey sanctuary that she is involved with. On Sunday we had Mass said by Father Chris, followed by the raffle, lunch and finally goodbyes, the end of another successful weekend.

My first outing as president was in October as part of the group that visited the Heritage Centre in Namur, organised so efficiently by Diane Donovan. (The report of this visit was in the 2015 St Julie News). The Heritage Centre is amazing, well worth the journey and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Flowers and a special greetings card were sent to Sister Mary Stephen Humphries by the Executive Committee on the occasion of her Golden Jubilee in September, she thanked us all for our good wishes.

It was agreed at the Executive meeting in November to have bookmarks printed to commemorate the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St Julie's death on 8<sup>th</sup> April 2016. Louise Enderby designed the bookmarks and had them printed, they were then distributed to every member of the Federation.

In February I travelled to Glasgow to attend a meeting of SPRED with Sister Agnes, who started the group. I was overwhelmed with emotion by the end of the evening when I saw how beneficial the sessions are. I spoke to mothers whose daughters

have been taking part in SPRED meetings for over 15 years. They couldn't speak highly enough of the benefits their daughters had received from the group and told me they don't know how they would have coped without SPRED in their lives. A high acclamation for the work of SPRED.

On Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> April I attended Southwark Notre Dame St Julie Day Celebrations. I was made to feel very welcome and it was lovely to see some familiar faces from previous Conference weekends. It was an extremely enjoyable day including a talk by Margaret Philpott a psychotherapist, who told us about some of the work she had done with prisoners. After Mass we had an excellent lunch and then were treated to a performance by Southwark Notre Dame pupils of their specially written musical "To Heaven on Foot" following the life of St Julie. It was an outstanding performance and it was so nice to see the girls giving up part of their weekend to entertain us. It was a thoroughly enjoyable day.

In May I attended the Manchester St Julie Day Mass after which we had lunch and a sing-along; there was also a raffle and various items on sale. Manchester's annual Strawberry Tea was held in July at the same venue, Our Lady of Grace Church in North Manchester. As well as tea, coffee and a tempting array of cakes there were lots of different stalls, a raffle and tombola. Both events were very enjoyable as well as being good fundraisers which helped to swell the charity's coffers.

I have enjoyed my first year as president of the BFNDNA, made much easier by the help and advice received from the executive committee, and I would like to thank them for their support during the past 12 months. I would also like to thank Father Chris for continuing to be our chaplain and Sister Jo Bushell for looking after us all so well when we attend our meetings in Liverpool. Thanks also to all of you for your continuing support for the charity and I look forward to seeing you all again next year.

I went to my first BOND reunion because a childhood friend, Mary Meads, nee Kenny, from Primary school through Notre Dame had just discovered it. We were not young then but were younger than most of the members. Our ND school had closed down and the building sold. She said how, although older, they had exactly the same ethos, the same values, that we shared and missed generally.

This reunion was to be a turning point in my life. I met Joy Laundry. Joy is now just two years off from receiving her birthday letter from the Queen. I teased Joy later by saying that she had seen a 'sucker' coming. First, she collared me for the next BOND President. It was far more work in those days.

I did, once, try to extend the membership through Friends Reunited. Never again, I decided. Over 70 BONDS turned up that time, some younger ones excitedly exchanging photos and news while mass was being said in the meeting hall. Our small committee was rushed off its feet making endless cups of tea with the ultimate washing and clearing up.

Thankfully, Facebook followed soon enabling smaller year groups to meet themselves and we sank back into our far smaller group. Margaret Lumley has arranged elegant lunch meetings and tours at such places as her old place of work, The Gentlemen's Club in London and the Temple Law Courts. She also arranged a Thames boat trip to Greenwich where we could look around and meet up for lunch. Sadly, Margaret is not as well as she was and no-one else has had the time to take this on.

Joy also discovered that I was an artist. She was and still is a committee member of the Society for Catholic Artists. She invited me to the AGM. I went, little suspecting what she had in mind for me. The meeting was most enjoyable. It was great to be amongst artists, several of whom were great characters. It was not long

before Joy had me coming to committee meetings so we could get to know each other and with the idea that I would become the next chairman.

Joy remarked that they were 'so lucky to have me'. My reaction was that for me it was such a great privilege! The SCA has opened up so much for me, planning exhibitions and setting them up, arranging events, compiling bulletins, etc. It has meant a great deal of work and with the website we are beginning to 'go international'. Certainly, we are unique in the world.

What I soon began to learn was that not only did we have artists of worth but the history of the society, begun in 1929, was rich in well-known artists' names, many of whom I had not realized were Catholic. Our works are up and down the country, in many churches, such as the Sacred Heart Church in Edge Hill, Wimbledon, in the hall of which we have our meetings. Indeed, whole churches have been built and three of our deceased members were responsible for most of the artwork in Aylesford, executed in the fifties when it had been bought back and renovated by the Catholic Church to become a place of worship again.

Recently, our vice president died after a long illness. The archives were passed on to me, boxes and bags of them from a basement. Despairing as to what to do with them, I set about airing out the mustiness of papers, books and photos around my home. Many of the photos had been caught just in time. They were almost beginning to stick together.

I searched and emailed on the internet, hoping for help in housing the new boxes I was packing them into for a small fee, perhaps finding an archives student whom we could pay a small amount to and could use the experience of organizing and cataloguing them for his or her C.V. I contacted museums, archives societies, colleges and universities over two days. The first reply was from the Society of Catholic Archives which is connected with Durham University. Could they phone me,

please? Oh, certainly! They were keen to help voluntarily, to know more and were very promising.

The next day, I had a similar request from the National Archives in Kew. She suggested I try Westminster Diocese archives – which I did. Gaining in confidence, I described more of the history in my email to them – and included the Nat. Archives lady in the email. She contacted me almost immediately with the news that she had spoken to someone at the Tate Gallery who thought they might be interested. I emailed even more of the history, describing the link we had with the Guild of St Joseph and St Dominic. This was set up by Eric Gill in Ditchling and comprised artists and craftsmen who worked solely to provide everything for priests, the mass and churches. The Guild was established in the same year as the SCA. When it disbanded, most of its members joined the SCA if they had not already done so.

I had another email from the National Archives lady informing me that I should contact the archives person at the V&A as they already had the archives of the Guild of St Joseph and St Dominic. This I did, immediately. He wanted to see them. He came to my home earlier this week, was most interested in what he saw. He has gone back to the V&A to advise them that they should take our archives on.

'Out of little acorns, big oak trees grow'. Little did I imagine when I first went begging about the archives that we would get so much in a cream of options. Little did I imagine when Mary, my old school friend invited me to my first BOND reunion with its members' charm, its raffles, its 'bring and buys' for the Federation charities, what amazing privileges and experiences were in store. God certainly has His plans!

**General Account & Charity**

I took over last year as the BFNDA representative on the NBCW. I have attended two meetings in October 2015 and February 2016. These meetings take place at Romero House, close to St. George's Cathedral, Southwark. Sadly, I was unable to attend the AGM in Birmingham in July. For those of you who know little of the organization I will quote the Mission Statement:

*“The National Board of Catholic Women actively seeks to promote the presence, participation and responsibilities of Catholic women in the Church and society in order to enable them to fulfill their evangelical mission and to work for the Common Good. It is a forum in which Catholic Women in England and Wales (members of Catholic organisations and other women representatives of diocesan structures) exchange experience, express their hopes and concerns and make recommendations on the life and mission of the Church. It forwards to Government and others, submissions dealing with matters of public interest and concern.”*

The NBCW is an umbrella organization which disseminates information from its constituent women's groups. Therefore, I receive a vast quantity of e-mails from the National Board which I forward to all members of the BFNDA Executive. There is a number of sub-committees which deal with the following issues: Health and Bio-ethics; Ecumenism and Interfaith; Education; Environment; International; Marriage and Family; Social Responsibility and Women In the Church. Every one will be aware of the Women's World Day of Prayer.

The next big event, on Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> September is an ecumenical service and march to show our own government and other world leaders that we care about refugees. This is timed to coincide with the meetings of world leaders to discuss the refugee crisis. The service is from 12pm – 12.45pm at St James' Roman Catholic Church, Spanish Place, 22 George St, London W1U 3QY.

This involved a probe which had been travelling for about ten years landing on a comet, and relaying photographs. Monica had attended Notre Dame Leeds and explained that, although it was unusual for girls to aim for a life in the scientific world, she took the decision after being influenced by a very inspirational teacher Miss Lawton – our well-loved and long standing member Margaret Lawton.

"It's landed - I've waited years for this", Professor Monica Grady has said, on finding out that the robot probe Philae had landed on a comet.

The landing caps a 6.4 billion-kilometre journey that was begun a decade ago.

Prof Grady of the Open University worked on a tool of the project called Ptolemy - a shoe-box-sized gas analysis instrument.

She was in on the Philae lander project from its earliest days and jumped for joy when she found out the news, even hugging the BBC's Science Editor David Shukman.

The gallery was on two levels - a higher level to the rear and a lower one to the front, about two feet wide and, perhaps, two feet deep. pair of them in a heap, on the floor of the lower level! I think they were so busy reminiscing that they just walked in and stepped straight over the edge! Fortunately, neither of them were badly injured and Penny took Stephanie straight off for a cup of tea while the rest of us finished the tour.

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## SISTER VERONICA TURNER 1927 – 2015

After attending Notre Dame Manchester, and teaching at St Augustine's All Saints, Manchester, Veronica went on to Ashdown, was headmistress of St Anthony's Scotland Road, Liverpool, and then spent 19 years in Nigeria where she became Postulant Mistress. I quote from people with whom she worked "Her great strength was working with youth.... She could keep any group joyfully singing Gospel songs for hours!" "Another gift was green fingers..... Students would help her as she planted and watered vegetables and flowers wherever she worked!" (I know that she smuggled seedlings into Africa inside balls of wool – knitting being another hobby that kept her busy.) "She befriended the vulnerable, especially prisoners in Auchinleck jail, who after their discharge would frequently visit her.... The conditions were terrible; no running water; and she went every week and on Christmas Day." She continued this work in Brixton where she was successful in helping a wrongly accused man to be freed. She finished her days in Parbold where a Sister wrote "we were all struck by her constant gentleness and cheerfulness, her peacefulness and her willingness to respond in every way to the care and love shown to her. Her silence was transformed by her smile which spoke volumes!" Some may remember her at Federation as the Sister who wore ankle socks!
